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

Thompson Memorial Disc Golf Course Proposal


Where are we now?

According to the Thomas Township website:

"In 2020, Thomas Township and it's Parks and Recreation Department purchased nearly 20 acres of land located along the South West corner of Roberts Park which extends to Dutch Rd. Throughout 2020 and into 2021, the Parks and Recreation department installed a 9 hole Disc Golf Course in memory of Chris and Mari Thompson. The Thompsons willed a donation to Thomas Township Parks and Recreation which helped fund the development of the course. Thomas Township chose to use the donation to create a unique attraction at one of its parks that would allow the community to come together and enjoy. There are plans to install an additional 9 baskets to make the course an 18 basket course, and cutting has begun in preparation. The plan is to have the next 9 hole ready for play in the spring of 2022."

As of the writing of this proposal, the course still sits at 9 holes. There have been steps taken towards acquiring an additional 8 acres of land adjoining the current course to the east which are to be used towards the expansion of the course. Since the course was first built in an empty farm field in 2020/2021, there have been an estimated 12 trees planted of substantial size, 6 of which were planted in between holes 1 and 2 and do not come into play on the course. There are several low-lying areas that hold water through much of the spring and following any substantial rain throughout the year.

If you look up reviews of the course on UDisc, the most popular app for disc golfers to find and review courses, there is a common theme of complaints among players. Reviews speak of the lack of obstacles, uneven gravel tee pads, and repetitive hole design. The positive reviews praise the course as being beginner friendly, which is one of the few benefits to the course as is. They also speak of the wildlife, as there are nearly always deer or turkeys to be found on the course.

Where do we want to be?

Now that we have examined the course as it stands, we can dive into what we want this course to become. This course is full of unrealized potential, especially considering the addition of the land to the east and the inclusion of existing land at Roberts Park. This property provides the opportunity to build a true tournament quality disc golf course, which would become a benefit to not only disc golfers, but to Thomas Township as a whole. To examine the benefits of a successful disc golf course, Wickes Woods, located in Saginaw Township is a convenient example. Last year 7 Professional Disc Golf Association Sanctioned tournaments were held at this course, with an average of 52 participants from as far away as Grand Rapids. These are people that would not have otherwise visited Saginaw Township. Wickes Woods is also home to two weekly league nights, with a doubles league on Mondays and a PDGA Sanctioned Singles league on Thursdays. These leagues also draw in players from around the area to the course.

Roberts Park is unique, as it is located extremely close to the main business district of Thomas Township. Tournaments and leagues alike would provide boosts to several local businesses along Gratiot. Speaking from experience, when players travel to a tournament there is usually a stop for Gatorade or other hydration from a local convenience store on the way, a quick run to a fast-food restaurant for lunch between rounds, and dinner on the way out of town after the final round. This does not only apply tournament and league play. The same can be said for the casual players that come to visit the course for fun. A quality disc golf course can draw players from tens, if not hundreds of miles away, many of which will happily spend time and money in the community surrounding the course.

Not only can a disc golf course boost business in the community, but tournament and league play can also have financial benefits for the Township that manages the course. Course rental fees are commonplace when running tournaments. According to a local Tournament Director that has held tournaments at all of the Tri-City disc golf courses, they pay anywhere from \$200-\$500 for course rental depending on the tournament and the number of participants. This helps ensure that the courses are kept in tournament ready condition, and that there are constant improvements being made.

The Thompson Memorial Disc Golf Course holds the potential to become a destination for disc golfers throughout the state of Michigan, and to become a major benefit Thomas Township as a whole. The question becomes, how do we realize this potential? What are the steps that can be taken to get from where we are now, to where we want to be?


What makes a disc golf course worth visiting?

This can seem like a very subjective question to answer, and to some extent it is. There are, however, several similarities that can be found between courses that are generally highly regarded within the disc golf community. One of the most important factors that comes into play is the idea of balance. As it sits right now, a player could come to the course at Roberts

Park and throw the exact same shot the exact same distance off of every single tee and easily score under "Iron Man Par" (score every hole as if it were a par 3). A common factor among the highest rated courses is variety. They include holes across the full spectrum of distances, shot shapes, and pars. An average player cannot step up to every tee pad with the exact same disc in their hand, throw it exactly how they did on every other hole, and expect to score well. Balance and variety are a large part of what makes a course fun and interesting to play.

Something else that is common among top courses is their inclusion of all skill levels. Maple Hill Disc Golf Course in Worcester, MA, the number 4 rated course in the world and number 1 in the United States, is a great example of this. On the UDisc app, there are over a dozen different layouts that can be played, from an easy "pitch and putt" layout, to the highly demanding Maple Hill Gold layout that is used on the Disc Golf Pro Tour. This can be easily achieved at any course through the addition of multiple tee pad locations for each hole, to cater to all players. This also makes it much more likely for a player to continually return to the course to challenge themselves on different layouts.

Another factor that the most popular courses seem to share is the idea of a "signature hole". For Maple Hill, Hole 1 is a long par 4 that plays downhill, over a pond, between two fields of Christmas trees, and through a manmade triple mandatory (a mandatory is something that players are required to throw to one side of — a triple mandatory is three mandatories in one). At Flip City Disc Golf Course, one of the highest rated courses in Michigan, the basket of hole 12 sits perched atop a stump that stands altogether over 10 feet high. It is tall enough that players have to climb a staircase to retrieve their discs from the basket. These signature holes help to make a course memorable and unique.

Finally, what brings these elements together is the hard work and dedication put in by the course designer themself. All of these different factors have to be put together in a way that is unique to each and every project. There is no real formula to creating a great course, it is almost more of an art form. Names like John Houck, Avery Jenkins, and Eric McCabe are household names in the disc golf world, purely due to their work as course designers.

Throughout the proposed phases, a key component is finding someone that can take all of the pieces and put them together in a way that best suits Roberts Park. Luckily, the township already has on-staff a course designer that has experience both building courses from the ground up, and expanding/improving on existing courses.

Phase 1 – Restoration and Improvement of the Existing 9

The first step towards creating a quality 18-hole disc golf course will be to bring the existing 9 holes up to the standards we are hoping to hold the entire course to. This will involve several improvements to address concerns with the existing course. Several holes will be redesigned to make the course more competitive.


Tee Pads – The gravel tee pads are borderline dangerous to disc golfers. Teeing off requires sturdy reliable footing, the standard for which is concrete. Turf can also be used, but is generally more expensive, and requires more frequent maintenance.


Obstacles – Currently, there are roughly 22 trees and large bushes in play on the course that come into play on the holes. This is not counting the 6 trees that were planted between the basket of hole 1 and the tee pad of hole 2, as they are purely aesthetic and do not provide an obstacle when playing. A significant amount of improvement could be made to the course with the addition of a relatively small number of trees.

Leveling – One way or another, the fairways need to be leveled out. This is something that will take time, and cannot be done overnight. A land grader can be used to level out the ruts that were created by the recent tilling of the fairways. Regular rolling, combined with prolonged use of the course will help to further this goal.

Field Prep — During the first two phases, it is imperative that work begin on prepping the newly acquired farm field for use as a disc golf course. The ground will need to be properly leveled and seeded to begin the process of creating a level playing field as soon as possible. Fairways will be seeded with grass, while natural growth will overtake the rough areas.

Drainage – Holes 2 and 9 are the two holes that would benefit most from drainage work. Both holes have a walkway between the tee pad and basket that ends up underwater due to the low-lying areas on either side of the path. Adding a drain and building up the path over it to form a natural walking bridge in the areas shown in the images below would allow these two holes to be played throughout the year.

Proposed redesign of current holes during Phase 1:

Hole 2 — The tee pad will be moved left approximately 40-60 feet, and the basket will be moved to the right closer to the woods. Trees will be planted in front of the tee pad on the right side of the hole. This will force players to throw a shot that moves left to right, instead of right to left, and will also make use of two of the trees that have already been planted between holes 1 and 2.


Hole 4 — The basket on this hole will be extended to create a true par 4 for intermediate to advanced players. Currently, the hole is at a distance that would be considered either a very short par 4, or a long par 3. Extending this hole would make use of some existing natural obstacles that are currently past the existing basket location.

Hole 5 — The current fairway of hole 5 is a natural low spot on the property, and has standing water for several months throughout the year. Currently the hole runs in a north/south direction. Repositioning it to play east/west would take it away from this low-lying area. This hole will also have a raised teeing area and an island green surrounded by out-of-bounds.

Hole 7 – The basket on current hole 7 will be lengthened to create a par 4. Trees will be strategically planted to shape the fairway and make it a two-shot hole.

Hole 8 — This is another hole like current hole 4, that sits in between par 3 and par 4 for an intermediate to advanced player. This hole will be shortened significantly to allow the lengthening of hole 7, and to make a true par 3. This hole will also have a man-made triple mandatory structure. It will be left open otherwise, the idea being to allow the wind to become a factor when attempting to throw through the structure.

Hole 9 – There will be a change to how the hole is being mowed, and the tee pad will be shifted to the left and angled towards the basket. The mowing shift will create optional left or right fairways that mirror each other, and allow players to choose a shot that travels left to right, or right to left. The tall weeds will be left in the center to create the separation between the two fairways.

Phase 2 – Addition of 3 Holes on existing property

The second major step would be to add the holes that will be located within Roberts Park. The course designer will work in tandem with the Parks Department to come up with a layout for 3 new holes that play in and around the wooded portion of the park in locations that are suitable for the course as well as continued use of the existing walking paths. These 3 holes will take advantage of the existing mature tree growth on the property, and add a much-needed element of technicality to the course.


Tree clearing – For the wooded holes, trees and brush will need to be cleared to create fairways. This will be an ongoing process as the holes begin to see use. Less is more to start with – it is much easier to remove something later than to add it back in.

Installation of tee pads – New forms will need to be built and leveled for the new tee locations.

Installation of baskets – Sleeves for each new basket location must be cemented into the ground, with the baskets to be installed once the concrete has set.

Continued improvement original 9 holes – During phase 2, feedback on the new hole positions and obstacles will determine if any additional trees need to be planted, or if any minor tweaks need to be made.

Pond construction on the new property – A pond will be dug in the low-lying area of the field for multiple reasons. This will give the water in the field somewhere to drain to keep it dry, it will provide an ideal obstacle for multiple new holes, and it will enhance the aesthetics of the course. As part of this process, a Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Permit will be required from Saginaw County, due to the proximity of the pond to the Companion Drain. A permit from the DEQ/EGLE will also be required, as portions of the field are in the 100-year floodplain. The dirt removed from the pond can then be used in Phase 3 to create elevation changes for the new holes.

Phase 3 – Addition of the Final 6 Holes

Following the addition of 3 holes in Phase 2, 6 holes will need to be installed on the newly acquired parcel. Prep work during phase 1 and 2 will ensure that the land is ready for work to begin.

Installation of tee pads – New forms will need to be built and leveled for the new tee locations.

Installation of baskets – Sleeves for each new basket location must be cemented into the ground, with the baskets to be installed once the concrete has set.

Creation of obstacles – This will be achieved in the same way it was for the original 9 holes. Trees will be strategically located, and other man-made obstacles built as needed.

Installation of tee signs – With the full layout finalized, new tee signs can be ordered and installed.

Installation of a warm up basket – Once a suitable parking area and starting point have been designated for the course, a warm up basket can be installed near hole 1.

Phase 4 – Continuing maintenance, improvement, and sustainability

Pavilion Construction – A pavilion located near hole 1 will be constructed to act as "tournament central" for tournament and league directors. Ideally, the pavilion will be large enough to serve dual purpose and will act as another rentable pavilion for activities other than disc golf. The pavilion cost listed later in this document is for a 20x30 structure, which would seat between 48 and 64 people.

Maintenance and Improvements – As needed, additional trees can be planted, potential short or alternate tee pad locations can be added, further trimming of the wooded portions of the course can be done, and other unique features can be looked at to help the course stand out.

Shared Use Potential – The work to improve and complete the course will also provide the opportunity to benefit other activities. A path can be created through that course that does not interfere with disc golf use, and could be used for both casual walkers and cross country meets. This path could also be used for hay rides during the Winter Wonderland event.

Estimated Costs

All of these proposed changes do come at a cost. The charts below list estimated costs for materials and supplies that would be needed for each hole. Estimates have been sourced from local retailers and suppliers. The cost of trees has been averaged across several fast-growing species available through Kluck's. For the purpose of this document, labor costs will be estimated at 25% of the material cost for each phase. It is anticipated that labor will be completed partially by Township Employees, and partially through volunteer efforts.





Funding Options

There are several options to raise funds and save money for the completion and improvement of the Thompson Memorial Disc Golf Course, in addition to the budgeting and allocation of Township Funds.

Hole Sponsorship Packages – Local business owners and other members of the community would be approached with the opportunity to sponsor a hole on the course. Ideally, the sponsorship cost would be enough to cover materials for the tee pad, a bench, a tee sign, and trees to be planted on the hole. The sponsor would have their logo or name printed on the tee sign for the hole they choose to sponsor. These sponsorships could also be sold at the Evening in the Park Event.

Fundraising Tournament(s) – The township could partner with representatives from the local disc golf community to set up a tournament or tournaments to raise funds for the course. A portion of each entry fee would go towards completion costs for the course. Temporary holes would be set up through Roberts Park to make a full 18-hole course for the tournament.

Grants — There are a plethora of grants through various sources that can be researched and applied for to provide funding for recreational facilities such as disc golf courses. For example, the Michigan DNR is currently taking applications for the Urban and Community Forestry Grant, which provides funding to plant trees on public lands.

Scouting and other community groups – Groups like the Boy Scouts can be a great resource when putting together a project like a disc golf course. For example, two very common choices for Eagle Scout projects are building benches and planting trees, both of which are needed on the course. All of the fundraising, materials, planning, and labor for an Eagle Scout Project are facilitated by the Eagle Scout Candidate and their Scout Troop. There would be minimal cost to the Township.

Closing Thoughts

According to the Thomas Township Parks and Recreation website "We strive to give you the best programs and parks possible." In the case of the Thompson Memorial Disc Golf Course, unfortunately that standard has not been lived up to...yet. Roberts Park itself is a beautifully maintained facility with some of the nicest amenities around, that is until you stumble upon the disc golf course. The good news is, with a minor course correction (pardon the pun), the Thompson Memorial Disc Golf Course can be brought up to the high standard that Thomas Township is known for. By taking the time to plan an effective course of action, breaking the restoration and completion work into multiple phases, using the resources and personnel at hand, and seeking out alternative sources of funding, the goal of creating a disc golf course Thomas Township can be proud of becomes significantly more attainable.

NATURE PRESERVE UPDATE

Our DNR 2021 Trust Fund Grant is in motion. Work started August 19. Trees have been trimmed or removed and the trail is being excavated.

The interior of the nature preserve is growing. Steve Servinski and Tom Lenon from Chippewa Nature Center agreed that mowing needed to occur, so it did.

The bids for installing the storage facility were due 8/23/24. Thanks to John for taking care of that. We should have an update by the commission meeting date.

NRDA-we are continuing our monthly check-ins with the DNR and U.S. Fish and Wildlife. We are working on spending down the funds that we were given in advance. We are planning on ordering more trees, equipment, and can submit hours that our staff worked in the preserve. We will have to cut them a check in mid-September to pay back any funds we did not spend and will go on a reimbursement plan after that.

NATURE CENTER UPDATE
